Dear Friends,

Holy Week is nearly upon us, and I couldn't be more excited to walk through this sacred time with all of you. You may have noticed I've been a bit quiet recently—I've been under the weather this past week. But I'm feeling much better now and ready to rejoin our community for the season.

Holy Week begins next Sunday, as we commemorate Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem, where He was welcomed by crowds waving palm branches and shouting, "Hosanna!" This marks the start of the most sacred week in the Christian calendar, leading up to His crucifixion and resurrection.

We have an event-filled week planned, and I hope you'll join us for these moments of reflection, worship, and celebration. While our services often focus on the key moments of Holy Week, you may wonder what happens on *Monday, Tuesday*, and *Wednesday* of this important week. Reflecting on these days reveals the richness of Jesus' ministry and his message.

Lessons from Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday

Monday: Jesus cleanses the Temple, confronting injustice and challenging the religious leaders by overturning the money changers' tables and driving out those who were buying and selling. He bodly calls out the corruption within the sacred space, declaring, " Is it not written, 'My house shall be called a house of prayer for all the nations'? But you have made it a den of robbers." (Mark 11:17) This act was not only a demonstration of righteous anger but also a powerful reminder of the purpose of worship spaces—to honor God and serve all people, not to exploit them.

Tuesday: Conflict continues with the Temple authorities, as they question Jesus' authority and challenge His teachings. Despite their attempts to trap Him, Jesus responds with wisdom and clarity. Ultimately, He shares the greatest commandments of all: "The first is, 'Hear, O Israel: the Lord our God, the Lord is one; you shall love the Lord you God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind and with all your strength.'The second is this, 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' There is no other commandment greater than these." (Mark 12:29-31)

With these words, Jesus summarizes the essence of God's law, calling us to prioritize love above all else—love for God with our whole being and love for others as we love ourselves. These commandments form the foundation of a life lived in harmony with God's will and in service to those around us. They remind us of the simplicity yet profound depth of faith and human connection.

Wednesday: Jesus is anointed in Bethany with expensive oil, marking a significant act of love and devotion. The Gospels provide different details about this event-Mark does not name the woman, with John identifies her as Mary of Bethany, the sister of Martha and Lazarus. Mary pours the costly perfume, made of pure nard, over Jesus, anointing Him as a gesture of deep respect and preparation for His burial. This act stirs controversy among the disciples, with Judas Iscariot questioning why the oil, worth a year's wages, wasn't sold to help the poor. However, Jesus defends Mary, explaining that her actions are beautiful and

meaningful. This moment reflects the tension between material concerns and spiritual devotion that will continue through Maundy Thursday.

From these events, we move into Maundy Thursday, where we commemorate the Last Supper, the final meal Jesus shared with His disciples before His arrest. It's a time to reflect on His teachings, the act of humility in washing the disciples' feet, and the institution of the sacrament of communion. Then comes Good Friday, when we solemnly remember the crucifixion and burial of Jesus, a day marked by mourning and prayer. Finally, we arrive at **Easter Sunday**, the joyful celebration of Christ's resurrection-a day filled with hope and renewal.

Friends, Holy Week is a time for reflection, commemoration, and community. I encourage you to take part in every opportunity to celebrate and remember the incredible gift of God's love during this sacred season.

I look forward to worshiping and walking this Holy Week with you. Please plan to join us and invite other to experience the power and hope of this meaningful time.


Progressive Christian Book Club




